Before conference sessions begin, join fellow urban and community forestry professionals for a guided tour of St. Louis that explores how trees, parks, and green infrastructure are helping shape a more resilient and equitable city. From the transformative Brickline Greenway and the iconic landscapes of Forest Park to neighborhoods recovering from tornado damage and addressing the lasting impacts of historic redlining, this tour highlights the power of community partnerships, innovative urban forestry practices, and strategic investment. Along the way, participants will see and discuss topics such as green infrastructure, Silva Cells, structural soils, urban forest restoration, disaster recovery, public-private partnerships, native landscape management, and place-based community engagement. More than a sightseeing experience, this tour offers a unique opportunity to learn from real-world projects, exchange ideas with peers, and leave inspired with practical insights for strengthening urban forests in your own community.

8:15-9:15am – **50 Years of Baseline and Trends in Urban Forestry Management**

How has urban forestry changed over the past 50 years—and what does that mean for the future of our communities? This session will provide a look at the evolution of urban forest management in the United States, anchored by insights from the new 2025 Municipal Forestry, Tree Activities, and Management Census. Drawing on data from more than 1,700 communities, we'll explore how urban forestry programs, budgets, policies, staffing, contracting, volunteer engagement, and tree care practices have transformed since 1974. This presentation offers a rare long-term perspective on where urban forestry has been, where it stands today, and where it's headed next.

The presenters will explore strategies for aligning programs with community and political priorities, working effectively within different forms of government, building lasting relationships with elected officials, and overcoming common challenges that can stall progress. "No" right now doesn't mean "never": How to increase buy-in to tree-planting programs

In many communities with low tree canopy, residents can be hesitant to embrace new tree planting efforts due to past negative experiences. This session shares research-based strategies for building trust, increasing community support, and creating more equitable, community-centered urban forestry programs. Presenters will explore practical approaches for engaging residents, developing meaningful partnerships, addressing barriers to participation, and empowering communities to become active partners in restoring and sustaining urban tree canopy.

Co-Designing Green Cities: Community-Led Urban Reforestation and Climate Action in Caguas, Puerto Rico

Discover how a community-centered urban reforestation initiative in Caguas, Puerto Rico, is using trees, partnerships, and local leadership to address extreme heat and build climate resilience. This session highlights a collaborative effort among nonprofits, community organizations, and local government that is engaging residents in tree planting, community nurseries, environmental education, and neighborhood greening projects.

NYC Parks Neighborhood Tree Planting Program- A Shift in Strategy to Address Equity & Efficiency

This session explores New York City's groundbreaking shift from a request-based street tree planting model to a proactive, data-driven strategy that prioritizes heat-vulnerable neighborhoods and advances canopy equity across all five boroughs. Learn how NYC Parks is implementing a comprehensive 9-year planting cycle that improves efficiency, eliminates a backlog of 42,000+ tree requests, and delivers more predictable, neighborhood-scale urban forestry services.

Canopy Conversation Topics

Topic	Conversation Leader
Tree Ordinances and Code	Drue Epping, Facet
This facilitated conversation examines different formats and structures for tree codes. Many tree codes are well-intentioned but end up creating friction, inequities, or compliance challenges because they are not tailored to city capacity, local context, or funding realities. Together, you'll share how data and community priorities can shape tree ordinances and discuss how different municipal tree code frameworks perform once adopted and enforced.	
Urban Wood	Thaddeus Driscoll, Colorado State Forest Service
This canopy conversation is an opportunity to discuss the why and how of developing urban wood programs from both municipal and state forestry perspectives. Gain insights into leadership, advocacy, coalition building, and the evolving role of city foresters in advancing sustainable wood utilization programs to connect the "chain" of urban forestry into circular systems.	
Sidewalks, PROWAG, and ADA	Stephanie Helms, City of Baltimore, Maryland and Darya Barar, HortScience - Bartlett Consulting
Join this conversation to discuss successful projects that, through thoughtful planning and collaboration, have achieved urban tree preservation in the right-of-way while complying with the anticipated new Public Right-of-Way Accessibility Guidelines (PROWAG) and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) guidelines.	
Maximizing Tree Planting Space	Jenn Cairo, City of Portland, Oregon
Space is the final frontier in urban areas, with nature and trees often seen as competing with built infrastructure and losing out. This conversation will begin with examples from Portland, Oregon and expand for all to share approaches to planting, tree care, policy, funding, and infrastructure conflict resolution that can be adapted in your own community.	
Long-Term Tree Stewardship	Asha-Lé Davis and Dana McNally, Pennsylvania Horticulture Society
Volunteer tree planting days are fun and rewarding! But, what happens after the final tree is planted? Join this conversation to discuss how to sustain long-term tree stewardship beyond the planting day.	

We'll look beyond tree distribution and planting and share how year-round engagement, operational support, and data-informed decision-making work together to build community capacity and grow equitable urban canopy.	
Quality Nursery Stock	Sarah Low, Oregon State University and Jim Grob, Urban Tree Root Quality Alliance
Join nursery professionals, urban foresters, researchers, and tree purchasers for an interactive discussion on improving urban tree root quality. This conversation will explore challenges throughout the tree production chain, the impacts of root defects on long-term tree performance, and opportunities for collaboration between growers and end users. Participants will share experiences and strategies related to specifications, inspections, contracting, and production practices that can help ensure healthier, more resilient urban trees.	
Partnership development	Alex Acevedo and Sarah Balistreri, City Parks Foundation
This discussion will explore strategies for building trust, increasing participation, and connecting urban forestry to broader community priorities such as public health, youth engagement, and neighborhood well-being. Through conversation and shared experiences, attendees will discuss successes, challenges, and practical approaches for creating more inclusive, community-centered urban forestry programs.	
Tree Risk Assessment and Management	Ryan Suttle, HortScience – Bartlett Consulting and Steve Duffy, Presidio Trust
How does a program move from tree risk assessment to strategic, defensible tree risk management? This conversation will focus on how communities can use data-driven information on likelihood of failure, tree condition, target characteristics, and tree size – within a GIS framework – to create repeatable prioritization across thousands of trees. Share ideas about how highest-risk conditions can be addressed first while maintaining operational efficiency.	
Tree Inventory Successes and Lessons	Anna Heckman, City of Kirkland, Washington
Join municipal representatives, consultants, and inventory field staff for an interactive discussion on tree inventory projects. Participants will share successes, challenges, and lessons learned throughout the process, from needs assessments and RFP development to contract management, implementation, and long-term staff engagement. Explore strategies for improving communication, aligning expectations, and creating inventory programs that deliver lasting value.
